



Barriers to Moving Research into Policy

Barrier	Example
1. Lack of value placed on prevention	Only a small percentage of the annual health care budget is allocated to population-wide approaches.
2.Insufficient evidence base	The scientific evidence on effectiveness of some interventions is lacking or the evidence is changing over time.
3.Mismatched time horizons	Election cycles, policy processes, and research time often do not match well.

Barriers to Moving-2	
Barrier	Example
5.Researchers isolated from the policy process	Lack personal contact between researchers and policymakers. Researchers not see it as their responsibility to think through the policy implications of their work.
6.Policymaking process can be complex and messy	Evidence-based policy occurs in complex systems. Decision-makers often rely on habit, stereotypes, and cultural norms for the vast majority of decisions.
7.Individuals not understand the	Transdisciplinary approaches are more likely to bring all of the necessary skills to

policymaking process as a whole

e.g. causes of neonatal deaths in rural Uganda



Stories maybe powerful






































Elevator Exercise !


